





A bit of editorializing - (b) (5) Deliberative Process

The EU has not been sitting on its hands over the past 30 years when it comes to promoting sustainability in farming.

EU farm policy has been reformed to a more greener, less trade distortive policy: the 2003 CAP reform is really a seminal step forward in making support to farmers conditional on sound environmental practice. And the proof in the pudding is the fact that the EU is the only major ag producing region which in the last 30 years has both increased production and level of productivity while at the same time reducing, by over 20 percent, greenhouse gas emissions. But we need to go further. The EU agricultural sector is responsible for about 10 percent of EU GHG emissions. That reduction has been flattening out in the last decade. A recent EU survey showed that the European public believe that farmers are trying to preserve the environment, but they need to do much more.

You probably heard of the European Green Deal, which is a commitment by Europe to go beyond formal Paris climate targets and become the first carbon neutral continent by 2050. That's not just a political commitment. The target of climate neutrality has been enshrined in law. Through legislation, we lashed ourselves to the mast of the ship like Odysseus. The agricultural sector, along with transport and construction, is one of the key sectors that will have to help reach our targets.

How do we get there? Broadly speaking, in two ways: the first way will be through the instruments of the future, Common Agricultural Policy, now being debated at the Council and the Parliament, which will enter into force in January 2023. And the new CAP proposes, and forgive me if I simplify, a minimum of 40 percent of the EU agricultural budget will be used to incentivize farmers to apply environmentally friendly farming practices or compensate them for any additional costs in doing so. Each EU member State will have to prepare and get approval for a strategic plan, showing, in evidence-based terms, how it would reach the environment and climate targets set out. This is the subject of a lot of debates at the moment. Some member States and some farm groups think we are being too ambitious. Others, notably civil society, NGOs, think we are not going far enough. So perhaps, on that basis, the balance is about right. ...

The second policy towards climate neutrality and a greener farm sector is the

so-called Farm to Fork Strategy, published earlier this year. This is not legislation, at this point. It is set of policy proposals and targets. The legislation to achieve these targets will be introduced progressively over the next four years. The Farm to Fork Strategy, in short, takes a whole food systems approach to improve sustainability of farming and food system, at all points of the production and supply chain. The COVID crisis has shown how important it is to have a resilient food system, including openness to trade. But that resilience can only be guaranteed if that food system is sustainable in the long-term. In fact, there are almost synonyms to each other.

The important part of the Strategy will fall upon the farm sector in Europe to implement. I would cite in particular the target of achieving 25 percent of land under organic production by 2030, up from just 8 percent today; halving the use of pesticides by the same date; reducing fertilizer use by 20 percent; a 50 percent reduction in antibiotic sales and use in the livestock sector; and a target elsewhere of ensuring that 10 percent of agricultural land is effectively put out of production to improve biodiversity, where we have some serious challenges. Universal access to broadband in rural areas is another target. That will be key for farmers to both gain productivity and also apply environmentally friendly practices with fewer inputs. But that's another subject.

Obviously Europe cannot, and should not, go it alone when it comes to achieving a more climate friendly farm sector. We will be working in the months ahead with our partners in WHO, FAO in the G-20, above all bilaterally to encourage others to raise their game similarly. This is not about achieving a level playing field between European farmers and third countries. It's really a frank recognition that if only the EU meets its Paris commitments, or its climate neutrality objective, then the climate crisis we face is not going to go away.

Responding to a question from the moderator (WTO's Doaa Abdel-Motal) on what Mr. Clarke had to say to countries' criticism of the Farm to Fork Strategy ("one country's non-trade concerns are another country's trade concerns"), he responded:

The EU is very well aware of its WTO commitments, and of course we will comply with them. The Farm to Fork Strategy underlines on several occasions that we will respect fully WTO rules when it comes to trade and imports.

Taking a step back, our own agricultural exports suffer enough from WTO incompatible practices from some of our partners, from protectionist measure. So we have every reason to be firm ourselves in applying the WTO rulebook. As Shakespeare said 'we are more sinned against than sinning.' So we will continue to lead by good example. The adults are in the room on this. We understand we need to base our regulatory decisions on a legitimate objective;

our rules must be non-discriminatory; there must be the least trade restrictive means to achieve that legitimate objective; and, of course, must not be presented as a disguised restriction. Consultation, transparency upstream will be an essential element of the regulatory approach. As a matter of credibility, the EU's leadership in multilateralism and our self-interest as the world's biggest exporter and importer, we have every interest in following the letter and spirit of WTO. Frankly, and you alluded to this in your opening remarks, Doaa, there is no disconnect between high levels of environmental protection and adherence to the WTO rulebook. The rules provide ample scope for Members to adopt environmental protection policies. And the objective, as you said, of sustainability and the environment is important enough to be now part of the preamble of the Marrakech Agreement [NB. and in the preamble to the Agreement on Agriculture].[Footnote 1] The Article XX [GATT] exception is well known to us all, and there is plenty of GATT jurisprudence today, guiding us on what is and what is not permitted under environmental rules that impact on trade. And frankly the WTO is not a race to the bottom, it is a race upwards, and it will be inconceivable that the WTO would be seen as a constraint on achieving the Paris goals that almost everybody signed up to, to achieving a meaningful outcome in next year's UN Food Systems Summit, or indeed in achieving the SDGs, which we all, without exception I think, signed up to.

I have heard some concerns expressed by a few Members, notably in relation to pesticides use and the possibility of prohibiting imports of products using certain pesticides which are banned in the EU. I think there is a virtual consensus that the use of certain pesticides does raise serious environmental concerns, such as impacting on the worldwide decline of pollinators or issues related to persistent organic pollutants [POPs]. These concerns cannot be brushed under the carpet. It means that in some cases where there are serious environmental concerns of a transboundary nature, we may reduce import tolerances, or simply not have any import tolerance at all for products on our market that have been using those pesticides. But, as I said, we will apply the rulebook very strictly here, we will take decisions on a case-by-case basis, drawing on the best available scientific evidence, and, of course, ensuring that our measures are no more trade restrictive than necessary to achieve the legitimate objective.

Our trading partners need not worry. We will be engaging very, very actively with all our trading partners, ... notably with developing countries, exporters to the EU, in particular Africa, which is very dependent on the EU market for commodity exports. We will be working with our partners to accompany the transition over the next decade towards a more sustainable use of pesticides, so that we avoid trade disruptions and we find alternative plant protection products and methods that will ensure that trade continues to flow and that we remain faithful to our WTO obligations.

....

On the carbon border adjustment mechanism, the intention at the moment is that this will not apply to agricultural and food products. It would apply to carbon intensive sectors such as cement or steel.

We just concluded a public consultation on this idea in EU. We are looking at the input, and we will come up with proposal in the Spring, which will be subject to a comprehensive impact assessment. It's very early days for this instrument, which we will use in the years ahead.

[Instead], in the Farm to Fork Strategy we have proposed a sustainability labeling scheme for agricultural and food products on the EU market, be they domestic or imports. That will be developed over the next 3-4 years. That, in some ways, will be an alternative to the CBAM.

One has to keep in mind the reasons to have a Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism: if we want to achieve climate goals, our Paris commitments, we can't do it if our measures, internally in the EU, simply lead to carbon leakage in other parts of the world who don't share the same kind of concerns or ambitions. So we have to apply this to both imports and domestic production.

Coming back to a point I made earlier on, measures which are grounded in science, which are not protectionist, which are seeking to tackle a global or transboundary environmental objective, they are, in principle, WTO compatible. The CBM will definitely be WTO compatible for those reasons.

- (A) If the service is related to item maintenance: A description of all covered Start Printed Page 42679telecommunications services offered (include on the item being maintained: Brand; model number, such as OEM number, manufacturer part number, or wholesaler number; and item description, as applicable); or
- (B) If not associated with maintenance, the Product Service Code (PSC) of the service being provided; and explanation of the proposed use of covered telecommunications services and any factors relevant to determining if such use would be permissible under the prohibition in paragraph (b)(1) of this provision.
- (2) Disclosure for the representation in paragraph (d)(2) of this provision. If the Offeror has responded "does" in the representation in paragraph (d)(2) of this provision, the Offeror shall provide the following information as part of the offer:
 - (i) For covered equipment—

- 2. 52.203-16 PREVENTING PERSONAL CONFLICTS OF INTEREST (JUN 2020)
- 3. 52.204-9 PERSONAL IDENTITY VERIFICATION OF CONTRACTOR PERSONNEL (JAN 2011)
- 4. 52.204-13 SYSTEM FOR AWARD MANAGEMENT MAINTENANCE (OCT 2018)

- (b) Safeguarding requirements and procedures.
- (1) The Contractor shall apply the following basic safeguarding requirements and procedures to protect covered contractor information systems. Requirements and procedures for basic safeguarding of covered contractor information systems shall include, at a minimum, the following security controls:
- (i) Limit information system access to authorized users, processes acting on behalf of authorized users, or devices (including other information systems).
- (ii) Limit information system access to the types of transactions and functions that authorized users are permitted to execute.
 - (iii) Verify and control/limit connections to and use of external information systems.
 - (iv) Control information posted or processed on publicly accessible information systems.
 - (v) Identify information system users, processes acting on behalf of users, or devices.
- (vi) Authenticate (or verify) the identities of those users, processes, or devices, as a prerequisite to allowing access to organizational information systems.

- (vii) Sanitize or destroy information system media containing Federal Contract Information before disposal or release for reuse.
- (viii) Limit physical access to organizational information systems, equipment, and the respective operating environments to authorized individuals.
- (ix) Escort visitors and monitor visitor activity; maintain audit logs of physical access; and control and manage physical access devices.
- (x) Monitor, control, and protect organizational communications (i.e., information transmitted or received by organizational information systems) at the external boundaries and key internal boundaries of the information systems.
- (xi) Implement subnetworks for publicly accessible system components that are physically or logically separated from internal networks.
 - (xii) Identify, report, and correct information and information system flaws in a timely manner.
- (xiii) Provide protection from malicious code at appropriate locations within organizational information systems.
 - (xiv) Update malicious code protection mechanisms when new releases are available.
- (xv) Perform periodic scans of the information system and real-time scans of files from external sources as files are downloaded, opened, or executed.
- (2) Other requirements. This clause does not relieve the Contractor of any other specific safeguarding requirements specified by Federal agencies and departments relating to covered contractor information systems generally or other Federal safeguarding requirements for controlled unclassified information (CUI) as established by Executive Order 13556.
- (c) Subcontracts. The Contractor shall include the substance of this clause, including this paragraph (c), in subcontracts under this contract (including subcontracts for the acquisition of commercial items, other than commercially available off-the-shelf items), in which the subcontractor may have Federal contract information residing in or transiting through its information system.

3.0 ADDITIONAL BPA REQUIREMENTS

3.1 BPA Annual Review

This BPA will be reviewed annually to determine whether it is in the best interest of the Government to continue use of this BPA. Either party, the government or the contractor, may cancel this BPA by providing written notice. The cancellation will take effect 30 calendar days after the other party receives the notice of cancellation. BPA cancellation does not release the BPA contractor from the duty to continue performance on existing orders. Ongoing orders will continue in accordance with their own period of performance, even if the BPA is cancelled.

3.2 Quarterly Status Report

The Quarterly Status Report (QSR) shall consist of high level and detailed information for each awarded call order. 3.3 Quality Assurance

The performance of BPA contract holders will be measured in two contexts. One will be at the Call order level using quality metrics specific to the nature of the work required on the Call order. The Government may specify required metrics for a specific Call order Quality Assurance Surveillance Plan (QASP). The QASP will provide oversight help to ensure that the vendor's service levels reach and maintain the required levels for performance of the call order. The Vendor will provide a Quality Control Plan in response to each call/call order QASP. At the government's discretion, the government may determine it is in the best interest for the contractor to provide a Quality Assurance Surveillance Plan as a part of the proposal under the Call order. The Contracting Officer Representative (COR), IAS Requisitioner, program official, or client/customer/end user from the requesting or requiring office is responsible for providing a Requirement Package to the appropriate contracting office. The Requirement Package contains some documents that will be a collaborative effort with the contracting officer.

- ◆ EFFECTIVE DATE: This AOP is effective on July 27, 2020.
- ♠ REVISIONS: Requirement Package Contents: renumbered and added #1 Acquisition Planning and #7 Acquisition Approval Request. Added text in items #2 Market Research, #5 Independent Government Cost Estimate, and #10 Contracting Officer Representative/Requirement Point of Contact.

This AOP replaces AOP No. 19, dated June. 28, 2017.

◆ AUTHORITY: FAR Parts 10, Market Research and 11, Describing Agency Needs; and FAR Subparts: 4.800, Government Contract Files, 7.1, Acquisition Plans, 12.602, Streamlined Procedures for Evaluation and Solicitation for Commercial Items, 15.304, Evaluation Factors and Significant Subfactors, and 32.7, Contracting Funding.

♦ REQUIREMENT PACKAGE CONTENTS:

The contents of the Requirement Package, at a minimum, must include as appropriate for the acquisition:

1. Acquisition Planning (FAR 7.1 and USDA Contracting Desk Book 407)
The purpose of this planning is to ensure that the Government meets its needs in the most effective, economical, and timely manner. Requesting activities must provide a written determination required by FAR 7.503(e), when submitting requests for procurement of services or products as a requirements plan or the acquisition plan, if applicable. It requires a collaborative effort with those responsible for significant aspects of the acquisition, such as contracting officer, small business, budget, legal, and technical personnel. The planner shall coordinate with and secure the concurrence of the contracting officer in all acquisition planning. 2. Market Research (FAR Part 10)

Market research involves obtaining information of the supplies or services being acquired. Market research is needed to develop the most suitable approach for acquiring, supporting, and distributing the supplies and services. The contracting officer may use the <u>findings</u> of the market research, if the data is current, accurate, and relevant and within 18 months period. If the market research shows the Government's requirement is available through the acquisition of a commercially item, then FAR Part 12, Acquisition of Commercial Items shall be used. Both the officials in the requiring and contracting offices will document the market research. 3. **Source List** (optional)

A list of recommended sources/vendors/Offeror based on previous acquisitions and market research results that can fulfill the Government requirements.

4. **Requisition Funding** (FAR Subpart 32.7, Contract Funding)

No officer, official or employee of the Government may create or authorize an obligation in excess of the funds available, or in advance of appropriations unless otherwise authorized by law (Anti-Deficiency Act, 31 U.S.C. 1341)." Before executing any contract, the contracting officer shall (a) obtain written assurance from responsible fiscal/budget/funds authority via the IAS Requisition for IQ-Commit (*Funded*) that adequate funds are available or (b) expressly condition the contract upon availability of funds via an IAS Requisition for IQ No-commit (*Subject to Funds Availability due to continuing resolution or next fiscal year*) (FAR Subpart 32.703-2). Ensure the IAS requisition(s) contains the appropriate Billing Code associated with the office that is requesting the services, supplies or equipment.

5. <u>Independent Government Cost Estimate</u> (IGCE)

Provides an estimate of the total cost of the requirements including labor, travel, and material, if applicable. The IGCE is compared with the offeror's proposal to determine responsiveness to the Government's requirements, reasonableness of the price/cost elements; and to defend, make tradeoff decisions, and manage the acquisitions throughout the life cycle of the requirement. Some tools (e.g., IGCE, CALC, Solutions Finder and Price Paid Portal) are available at Acquisition Gateway at https://hallways.cap.gsa.gov.

6. **Description of Requirement** (FAR Part 11, Describing Agency Needs):

States the agency's needs using market research to (i) Promote full and open competition (FAR Part 6), or maximum practicable competition when using simplified acquisition procedures, with due regard to the nature of the supplies or services to be acquired; and (ii) only include restrictive provisions or conditions to the extent necessary to satisfy the needs of the agency or as authorized by law.

a) Supplies/Products -

The essential (salient) physical characteristics or federal specifications describing the supplies or products to be acquired.

b) Services -

- i. <u>Statement of Work (SOW)</u> is a technical description of the requirement. The requirement should address the questions below. The SOW may include both services and supplies, and will contain:
 - Who (agencies/offices) is responsible for the objectives of the requirements along with background/overview of the requirement and it conformance with the agency's needs?
 - o What services will be performed?
 - Where will performance be conducted?
 - o When is performance required and/or the dates for any deliverables?
 - Applicable Drawings and/or Specifications
 - o Government Furnished Material/Equipment Listing
- ii. Performance Work Statement (PWS) states what is to be accomplished (end results of the contractor's performance) so that agency officials can monitor and evaluate the contractor's progress and final results of the requirements completed, rather than how the contractor is to complete the requirements. The PWS should allow the contractor the maximum flexibility to devise the best method to accomplish the required results. The PWS can include both services and supplies. A PWS will include:
 - Measurable Performance Standards (i.e., in terms of quality, timeliness, quantity)
 - Methods of assessing contractor performance against the Performance Standards
 - Performance Incentives (positive/negative), where appropriate (FAR Subpart 16.402-2)
 - o Applicable Drawings and/or Specifications
 - o Government Furnished Material/Equipment Listing
- iii. <u>Statement of Objectives (SOO)</u> states the overall basic and top-level objectives of an acquisition in lieu of a written SOW. It provides the Offeror the flexibility to develop cost-effective solutions and the opportunity to propose innovative alternatives meeting the objectives. The SOO can be used for both services and supply type contracts, but the requirements must be complex in nature.

7. <u>Acquisition Approval Request</u> (AAR)

Include the AAR approval for applicable IT purchases. See USDA Contracting Desk Book §407.104 General Procedures at https://www.dm.usda.gov/procurement/policy/index.htm.

8. Justification and Approval

Includes any required justification and approval documents that must be prepared prior to contracting for a supplies or services (e.g., limited source/other than full and open competition justifications, if applicable (see AOP No. 5 at https://www.dm.usda.gov/oppm/pod/aop.htm).

9. Evaluation Criteria

The scope of evaluation factors/criteria is dependent upon the complexity of the requirement. Technical capability may be evaluated by how well the proposed products meet the Government requirement. Evaluation criteria may be required to commensurate with the level of effort and complexity of the acquisition requirement.

10. Contracting Officers Representative / Requirement Point of Contact

A nomination of an employee with the requisite skills, training and technical expertise to oversee the project performance and meeting the requirements to be certified under the Federal Acquisition Certification - Contracting Officer Requirement (FAC-COR) or a Requirement Point of Contact to ensure receipt and acceptance of the contract requirements from the requesting office. See the criteria to submit the Nomination of COR form in the USDA Contracting Desk Book, §401.602-2, Designate a COR at https://www.dm.usda.gov/procurement/policy/index.htm. See AOP No. 2, FAC-COR and AOP No. 13, Delegation of COR at https://www.dm.usda.gov/oppm/pod/aop.htm for additional agency guidance.

11. Invoice Processing Platform (IPP) Invoice Approver

The name of the Requirement Point of Contact designated to receive and accept the supplies or services, and recommend the invoice for payment, if the individual is not designated as a COR under the contract.

1. 11 EU countries call for Farm to Fork targets to be voluntary

Eleven Central and Eastern European countries signed a common <u>declaration</u> today, calling for the European Commission to make the Farm to Fork strategy's targets voluntary and to adjust them to the specific circumstances of each country.

The document — signed by the agriculture ministers of Poland, the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Hungary, Croatia, Slovenia, Lithuania, Latvia, Estonia, Bulgaria and Romania at a meeting in Poznań, Poland — also says that the countries "regret" that the Commission did not discuss the proposed targets further at the EU level before publishing the strategy in May.

The Farm to Fork plan includes <u>targets</u> for halving the use and risk of pesticides by 2030, as well as increasing organic farming across the Continent.

The ministers also stressed that according to the EU's next long-term budget proposal, so-called external convergence (equalizing payments for farmers across Europe) won't be achieved. They argue that continuous inequality in direct payments should be taken into account when the Commission decides on how much farmers will have to adopt new, costly green practices to receive funds under the Common Agricultural Policy.

DRIVING THE DAY

BRUSSELS CONFRONTS CAPITALS OVER PESTICIDES, ANIMAL

WELFARE: The European Commission has threatened to take every EU government to court if they continue to flout the bloc's rules on reducing the environmental impact of pesticides and securing the welfare of farm animals, according to documents obtained by Morning Agri under a freedom of information request.

Comply way or the highway: In 27 letters to national governments, EU Health and Food Safety Commissioner Stella Kyriakides demanded that EU countries "ensure immediate and full compliance with EU requirements" linked to the Farm to Fork strategy, which as newsletter readers will know aims to make the food system more sustainable by 2030 as part of the Green Deal. The documents reveal the full extent to which EU countries are failing to adhere to long-established EU rules on pesticides and animal welfare.

Talking tough: "I would like to confirm our determination to take decisive legal action in case of systematic non-compliance," Kyriakides wrote in letters she sent to EU agriculture ministers in May, on the same day that the Commission unveiled its Farm to Fork strategy, which pegged lofty targets to reduce the risk and use of pesticides by 50 percent and revamp the EU's animal welfare legislation.

Extent of problems revealed: POLITICO reported on the Commission's stern letter to Germany back in June, but the suite of letters reveals the full scope of EU countries' failings. The Commission named 82 points on which 23 EU countries are failing to meet EU pesticide standards in a directive on the sustainable use of agrichemicals, despite the fact the law dates from 2009.

Some countries, such as Hungary, Poland, the Czech Republic and Spain, were also reprimanded over the conditions of animal transport, a subject that has only become more topical with the first meeting of the Parliament's new animal transport committee Wednesday (more on that below).

On the second question, we defer to USDA/Washington on the SSP or USM providing opening remarks. The date we are likely to coalesce around is October 26. OCS Jamie Adams recommended late October due to the possibility of the ERS Farm to Fork modelling results being available by then. Farm Europe came back with October 26 and we need to finalize that with OCS. The Farm Europe opening speaker will be Norbert Lins, Chairman of the European Parliament Agriculture Committee. This would be the opposite to either SSP or USM. For the technocratic policy discussion OCS has REE DUS Dr. Scott Hutchins. Opposite Dr. Hutchins, Farm Europe has Pierre Bascou, Deputy Director General of Sustainbility at DG AGRI. We are also planning for speakers from each side to represent agricultural research and an actual farmer. An exclusive interview with US Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue

With the coronavirus still raging across much of the world, the economic hardship brought on by the global pandemic has taken a heavy toll on every key industry in both the United States and the EU, including agriculture.

US Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue sat down with New Europe in an exclusive interview to discuss how the US' encouragement of innovation and new technology can help farm operations of all sizes and how, as close allies and trade partners, Europeans and Americans can forge an even stronger relationship that will help guarantee a sustainable food supply for the world's billions of people.

NEW EUROPE (NE): COVID-19 has brought home the fact that we can no longer afford to take food security for granted. While the US embraces new technology and innovation, the EU's Farm to Fork strategy promotes more traditional, low-tech farming methods instead. How important is innovation to securing our food supply? Is it at odds with the EU's sustainability goals? Can we meet the enormous challenge of feeding a world population of 10 billion people in 2050 by farming the same way our grandparents and great-grandparents did?

SONNY PERDUE (SP): By 2050, it is estimated the world population will reach 10 billion people. Since we are working from a fixed resource base, to be successful we must embrace the technological advances and innovations of modern agriculture that increase productivity.

US agricultural output has grown significantly over the past 90 years. We've increased the production of food and fiber by over 400% while using nearly 10% less land. We are achieving this dramatic increase in productivity with fewer resources by harnessing innovation and technology.

The EU's sustainability goals laid out in the Farm to Fork agenda are commendable but will be extremely trade prohibitive and jeopardize agricultural output. Turning the clock back on agricultural advances in the EU will lead to less productivity and more food insecurity around the world. The global goal should be to produce more food with less land; not less food with less land as proposed in the Farm to Fork strategy. We believe the US model of science-based, technology-harnessed agriculture is the only way we will as a world be able to keep the pace and feed all the hungry mouths in the future.

NE: Are you concerned about the effect this will have on the already contentious disputes over agricultural trade?

SP: We understand and fully share the European Commission's desire to ensure safe and sustainable food supply but there are several paths to attaining this. Implementing so-called "higher standards" that are not internationally recognized or scientifically supported will create unfair trade barriers. European farms aren't able to compete with one hand tied behind their back; these types of practices lead only to protectionism. The EU's carrying out Farm to Fork would be like stopping all transatlantic flights and going back to sentimental ocean liners of the past – it just doesn't make sense.

NE: Almost all of the EU's major trading partners—some 36 nations altogether—have officially complained to the World Trade Organization that the EU's precautionary import restrictions are damaging their farmers and constitute illegal barriers to trade because they are not based on science. Farm to Fork doubles down on these policies, promising to withhold access to EU markets unless other nations adopt similar regulations. How can these two diametrically opposed positions be reconciled?

SP: Dumbing down agriculture production is not the answer to this complex problem. Earlier this year, I launched USDA's Agriculture Innovation Agenda, which aims to increase production by 40 percent while cutting the environmental footprint of US agriculture in half by the year 2050. We know for a fact that embracing innovation to accomplish these goals is the best way to go. Ultimately, the choice needs to be up to the consumers. Consumers are not going to provide food for their families that they believe to be unsafe.

For some time, we have had concerns about the EU imposing trade barriers on imported goods based on how those goods are produced rather than on whether they are safe. This undermines a rules-based global trading system.

NE: There are a lot of people who are very pro-technology who, in general, treat agriculture as an exception. They want the latest technology and science for their medical care but, when it comes to food, they think "natural" is healthier and safer. Yet, the greatest dangers in our food supply are all-natural. Should we be worried about the effects of the EU's actions on the safety of the global food supply, especially if these bans are adopted by other countries?

SP: Certainly, because the EU can't have it both ways. Reducing farmers' access to the tools that protect against pests is reckless. The loss of crop protection tools leads to lower productivity and more rot and waste, which causes problems up and down the food supply. Food quality suffers, food safety suffers, and food security, as a whole, suffers. This would be like if we took a serious disease, like smallpox, and stopped vaccinating people even though we know that would prevent people from getting smallpox. That's what the EU is trying to do with agriculture. So yes, we should be very concerned about the effects of the EU's actions.

We all want a more sustainable future, but we need to better understand the downstream effects or tradeoffs of the decisions we make. Much of what the EU is proposing in the Farm to Fork strategy may lead to a less sustainable EU, and the impositions on trading partners could increase risks to small-scale farmers in Africa, Latin America, and Asia. Yet, to my knowledge, the EU hasn't released any analysis to show the tradeoffs of their proposition. It seems clear that the Farm to Fork strategy will negatively affect the livelihoods of EU farmers and, most likely, have detrimental impacts on the food security and environmental footprint of small-scale farmers in the developing world if they are required to adopt the requirements in order to trade with the EU.

NE: How will the US-UK trade negotiations be affected if the UK maintains an EU-style precautionary system and import barriers?

SP: The UK has always been a champion of scientific, evidence-based decision making. I am confident that, as it begins to make its own regulatory decisions going forward, we will find common ground.

NE: Jon Entine said that the low-tech, low-yield agriculture being adopted in the EU is effectively exporting Europe's environmental footprint to developing nations that will have to make up for the EU's productivity shortfall by expanding agricultural land in their own countries. How serious do you believe the global environmental implications of these policies are?

SP: It's difficult to evaluate tradeoffs and assess the indirect impacts of even the most well-intentioned policies. But I can say, with certainty, that the US approach to prioritizing conservation and improvements to total factor productivity is one of the best solutions we have for meeting growing global demand while limiting agriculture's environmental footprint. The economic cost of Farm to Fork to the European consumer on a limited budget is significant. Currently, Americans spend about six percent of disposable income on food compared to France where consumers spend thirteen percent of their disposable income on food. This divide will only become greater if the EU's Farm to Fork policies go into effect.

NE: What about broader humanitarian and even national security concerns? The majority of undernourished in the world are, ironically, farmers in the developing world who can't grow enough to feed themselves. If we deny these farmers the tools we in the developed world count on, do we risk exporting a humanitarian disaster?

SP: Modern agricultural production tools – including pesticides, fertilizers, and genetically enhanced plants – afford farmers the advantage of managing their production for higher yields. If farmers in the developing world are allowed to access to these inputs, it can help alleviate (or at least minimize) food insecurity. A great example of this are the locust plagues in Africa, where not using these tools can create a humanitarian disaster. Much of the migration that happens around the world are displaced populations looking for food. If pesticides, fertilizers and genetically enhanced plants can prevent this, we should embrace it.

NE: One thing the US and EU have in common is that agricultural policy is increasingly dominated by "urban elites" that have no direct tie to the land and have little appreciation of farming's enormous challenges and complexities. What are the social and political ramifications of this urban elites vs. farmers divide, and how can we elevate the farmers' voice so that their real-world experience and practical knowledge is taken into account in the formulation of an agricultural policy so that the farmers are not seen as the problem but the solution?

SP: This is not as universal in the United States. While I agree it's the people in the US and the EU that can most afford the higher cost that tend to influence the development of laws affecting agricultural policy, US producer organizations and State and Federal Government officials are well aligned in seeking ways to improve the sustainability and profitability of US agriculture and meet consumer demands while making responsible use of public funds. Unfortunately, the great miracle of modern agriculture is a story that is not always told. We have the safest and most affordable food supply in the history of the world, thanks to technological advances. We believe we have the social responsibility to feed the growing world population, especially in the developing world.

NE: In the EU, "intensive agriculture" is almost universally considered bad for the environment. Where do you stand on this? The US has pioneered innovations like no-till farming, disease-resistant GMO crops, and now gene-editing. Those techniques improve yield, but what about the environment? Could you talk a bit about these, and how you feel our two respective systems stack up on environmental issues?

SP: The United States is proof that sustainable agricultural intensification is possible. One example of this is how US agricultural output has grown significantly over the past 90 years. We've increased the production of food and fiber by over 400% while using nearly 10% less land. Additionally, genetically engineered crops with pest management traits often yield better than their conventional counterparts, particularly when drought is present. The widespread use of these crops has the potential to increase the resilience of the US production system. For example, planting GE corn that is insect resistant and herbicide tolerant can increases yields by almost 10%. It is also false to assume that more traditional, small-scale farming systems cannot, simultaneously, increase yields and reduce their environmental footprint by adopting innovative practices and approaches.

NE: There's a widely held view that when it comes to farming, smaller is better. Locally produced food is better than a global supply system, and it supports family farms. High

yields are all about profit. The US appears to see these things differently. Does the US believe bigger is better? Are there greater efficiencies of scale? Are higher yields—producing more food on each hectare of farmland—be better for the environment?

SP: There are some common misconceptions about US agriculture. One misconception is that all of our farms are colossal and corporate. In fact, almost 90% of farms in America are small farms. These family farmers are the world's best environmentalists. We absolutely support local and regional food systems, but we also emphasize that resilient food systems depend on well-functioning markets and rules-based international trade. In 1950, 72% of the world's population lived below the poverty line. Today, less than 100 years later, less than 10% of the world's population lives below the poverty line. This dramatic transformation happened in great part due to increases in agricultural productivity. Thanks to policies that spurred investment in new technologies, we are able to produce more food and trade it globally, which directly benefits consumers all over the world. We have a social responsibility to ensure that food is affordable and available to everyone.

NE: Finally, Mr. Secretary, is there anything we haven't covered, some particularly important message you would like to send to your counterparts in the Commission and the people of the EU?

SP: We commend the EU's commitment to sustainability. We know the challenges before us, and we appreciate the call to action on enhancing the sustainability of our food systems across the three dimensions: environmental, social, and economic sustainability. We want to work with the EU toward sustainably feeding nearly 10 billion people by the year 2050 while allowing their farmers to compete equitably with those in the US. It is important that as we create policies to protect the environment and enhance food security and nutrition, they are not mutually exclusive. We need to promote policies that are transparent, data-driven, and science-based and do not restrict trade nor food availability.
